CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES AHEAD

As a member-owner of Kandiyohi Power Cooperative, you are part of a community that values reliable and affordable electric service. These two items, reliability and

affordability, remain central to us as we explore cost-effective ways to solve industry challenges that have direct implications on electricity rates in both the short-and-long-term.

2040 Carbon-Free Mandate

A significant milestone on the horizon is the 2040 Carbon-Free mandate in Minnesota. This law requires the state to transition to a carbon-free electric grid by the year 2040. The transition calls for substantial investments in renewable energy sources and storage, and the chase for clean baseload power requires the ability to explore nuclear power. These investments are essential to replace fossil fuel-based energy generation and achieve the mandate's objectives, but multi-day battery storage isn't quite ready for primetime and more importantly there is a nuclear moratorium in Minnesota.

Transmission Buildout in the MISO Region

Another critical factor impacting the future affordability of electric service is the major buildout of transmission infrastructure in the Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO) region. The MISO region encompasses several states, including Minnesota, and plays a vital role in coordinating the generation and transmission of electricity. As we integrate more renewable energy sources into the grid, upgrading and expanding the transmission network becomes crucial. This buildout ensures that electricity generated from renewable sources can be efficiently transmitted to where it is needed most and avoid congestion on existing transmission lines. Our power provider, Great River Energy, plans to make more than \$2 billion in strategic investments in these projects to help mitigate the financial impact on member-owners. Regardless, the costs associated with these infrastructure enhancements are significant and will be reflected in future electric service rates.

Rising Material Costs

Since 2020, we have consistently witnessed significant increases in the costs of materials required for maintaining and upgrading our electric infrastructure. Items such as transformers, power lines, and other essential equipment have seen price hikes due to various factors, including supply chain disruptions and increased demand. Unfortunately, the uncertainty surrounding new tariff policies has further exacerbated these cost pressures. As we await clarity regarding these policies, we anticipate that material costs will continue to rise. This projected increase necessitates careful financial planning and prudent management of our resources to mitigate the impact on our members.

Cost of Purchasing Power

The cost of purchasing power is KPC's largest expense. Over the last three years, we have seen this cost increase by over 20%. In response to this, KPC has implemented necessary rate adjustments to maintain financial stability while continuing to provide reliable electric service. Member rate adjustments, however, have been significantly lower than the rise in operating costs. This has only been possible through strategic, timely decision making, and a passionate staff focused on finding cost savings and efficiencies wherever possible.

Our Commitment to You

Despite these challenges, our cooperative remains steadfast in its commitment to protecting the future affordability of electric service for our members. We are actively exploring innovative solutions and strategies to manage costs while maintaining the reliability and quality of our service. Our focus remains on investing in energy efficiency programs, advocating for fair regulatory policies, and utilizing technology and a talented workforce to navigate the roads ahead.

Thank you for your ongoing support and commitment to KPC. We will keep you updated on any developments and continue to work tirelessly to serve our community's energy needs.




The Credentialed Cooperative Director (CCD) program
