It was stressed that emergency crews contact KPC immediately of an incident/situation and location if it is in KPC's territory. We also encourage our members to call us if you come across something that doesn't look right so that we can check it out and keep everyone safe.

Online gaming with each active player using their own computer, display, gaming console and internet connection gets pricey. Play each other at home on one screen and save.





Call us if your power goes out even if you think your neighbors already did. Leave one light on so you know when power has been restored and make sure you have an emergency kit ready.


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




ALL-EMPLOYEE SAFETY DAY...

On March 8th, KPC offices were closed as employees and staff began their annual "Safety Training Day". After enjoying breakfast, hosted by the Safety Committee, we broke into teams and started the day with an icebreaker.





We enjoyed special speakers throughout the day. Our first speaker was Lydia from Minnesota Rural Electric Association (MREA). She shared with us reasons why accidents happen, measures to take to prevent them from happening and what to do if an accident does happen. Our second speaker was Thomas Goeltz, a Safety Consultant with the National Safety Council (NSC). Thomas' message to us was on Distracted Driving. It was a heart-wrenching, eye-opening topic as he shared with us the loss of his daughter two years ago because of a distracted driver on his phone. At the time of her death, his daughter had a two-year old little girl and was pregnant. Not only did Thomas lose his daughter but also a grandson that he never had a chance to meet. He shared the statistics with us on texting and/or talking on our cell phone hands-free. He said that while talking during a phone conversation, hands-free, your distraction level is the same as a .08 DUI. He did a demonstration with us to show how distracted we truly are, even when we think we aren't. Our final speaker was one of our own Line Superintendent, Scott Luberts. Scott shared with us his own personal story of his accident on the job at KPC 26 years ago. This was the first time he had openly talked about the accident, what had happened and how it changed his life as he once knew it. When he assessed the accident - he wouldn't have done anything differently. Sometimes you can do all the right things to stay safe and an accident still can happen.

Our day ended with team building activities which involved several tasks and a race to see which team could finish first. Overall, it was a very positive day, reminding us to stay safe on and off the job, to work as a team and watch out for one-another. Thank you to the KPC Board Directors who visited throughout the day and to the Safety Committee for organizing an awesome and very important training. STAY SAFE!

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
